t certainly is a great privilege and high honor for me to serve as your co-president with my friend and very talented Jane Schmiedekamp. When men were authorized to become members of AAUW I became the first male member of our branch, and I have been told that I am one of the first two male members to become president or co-president of an AAUW branch.

There were those who said it was a just reward for my having been responsible for opening the National Press Club to women members. I had proposed the amendment to the NPC bylaws to permit women to join, and 75 percent of the male members voted in favor of the amendment.

I have since sponsored nine of the first 27 women members including Katherine Graham who was at that time publisher of The Washington Post. We now have more than 1000 women members, several of whom have become president of the NPC.

Women have made many gains in the past century. But despite those gains there remain many injustices such as not earning equal pay for equal work.

In addition to the outstanding work our and other branches have done in the STEM program, we continue to be in the forefront of supporting equality in the workplace and opposing discrimination in any form.

I regret that on Dec. 6 I had a great fall in Great Falls and broke my right ankle. I thus may be unable to undertake all the responsibilities expected of me. But I am currently undergoing rehabilitation and hope to be able to fulfill my duties soon.

I look forward to attending our meetings this winter and to getting together with all of you dedicated women again.

#### AAUW of VA Woman of Achievement Kathryn C. Thornton NASA Astronaut

athryn Thornton was our #1 choice for this award in 2014, but she couldn't accept it because she was already committed to a presentation elsewhere. She had several firsts as a woman astronaut in her 12 years with NASA: she was the first fomale grow member aboard

with NASA: she was the first female crew member aboard the Space Shuttle Discovery, she was the second woman to walk in space but her record for the most space walks by a female was held for 12 years, *and she was the first astronaut to use a power screwdriver in space*.

In her post-career as a professor and dean at the University of Virginia, she has been committed to educational outreach, including co-authoring a science program for K-6. She is currently a member of the board of the Astronaut Scholarship Foundation, which seeks to retain the U.S. world leadership in science and technology by providing college scholarships to students pursuing STEM degrees, as well as promote the importance of science and technology to the general public. She is featured on the National Earth Science Teachers Assn website "Windows to the Universe."

She says, "The younger generation needs to be pulled rather than pushed into science and engineering." To her there is no more powerful pull than the opportunity to explore the universe. She has testified before Congress to preserve and fund the space programs.

I found a quote from a young girl that is pertinent to our

award: "She is an important woman because she led a lot of women to further their education in the field of physics and astronomy as well...She is an important leader for women who think they can't do much when they really can achieve a lot."

If you'd like to see a video of her speaking to the USA Science and Engineering Festival (which focuses on students) in 2014, google Kathryn Thornton and then scroll down until you come to the link for <u>www.usasciencefestival.org</u>. (You can't find it by going straight to their website.) She's a very good speaker. She definitely fits our criteria as a Woman of Achievement.

Kathryn C. Thornton is a professor at the University of Virginia in the School of Engineering and Applied Science in the Department of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering. She served from 1999 until 2012 as the Assistant Dean and later Associate Dean for Graduate Programs. Selected by NASA in May 1984, Thornton is a veteran of four space flights. She was inducted into the Astronaut Hall of Fame in 2010, only the third woman to hold this honor.

She received a bachelor of science degree in physics from Auburn University in 1974; a master of science degree in physics from the University of Virginia in 1977; and a doctorate of philosophy in physics from the University of Virginia in 1979.

Married to Stephen T. Thornton, of Oak Ridge, Tennessee. She has two stepsons and three daughters. She enjoys scuba diving and skiing.

## A New Branch Bylaws Amendment for Discussion and Vote

The following proposed amendment to our branch's bylaws (1/7/16) was approved by the board at its January meeting and is submitted to the branch members for discussion and vote at the March meeting.

Rationale: Many women have attended our events as guests or members of the public and have expressed interest in joining the branch to support our mission. In particular, the branch's book sale attracts not only buyers from the larger community but also people interested in its preparation. There have been a number of women who ask to help with the sorting and selling, for instance. They have contributed their interest, time, and effort. Invariably they may ask to join AAUW since they find they support its mission and they desire to contribute. When they discover that a requirement to be a member is a degree from an accredited college, (two year or four year), they realize they are not eligible. One such volunteer even donated \$75 after she was told of AAUW's member requirements.

Other AAUW branches have also recognized the commitment, experience, and value of these affiliates.

To promote the inclusivity of AAUW and to appreciate the benefit derived from such people who support the mission and are willing to contribute, the following amendment to our branch bylaws is presented for discussion and vote.

NOTE: Changes are written in **Bold** *Italics* 

Replace Article IV. Section4. Student Affiliates with

#### Section 4. Affiliates

**a.** Student Affiliates. An undergraduate student enrolled in a qualified educational institution shall be eligible for student affiliation. Student affiliates shall be entitled to attend branch, state, multistate, comparable AAUWaffiliated entity and AAUW meetings and receive the publications distributed to all members of AAUW. Student affiliates may not vote or hold office. Fees for student affiliates shall be established by the AAUW Board of Directors. State fees shall be established by the state board of directors. Branch fees shall be established by the branch Board of Directors.

b. Other Affiliates. The Branch may have nonvoting affiliates, whose rights to vote and hold office shall be in accordance with the bylaws of AAUW and of the Branch. Affiliates shall pay only Branch dues.

#### **Mandated Bylaws Changes Approved**

AUW Board Chair Patricia Ho, stated in a recent memo that the IRS-approved contract between AAUW state organizations and branches and AAUW national must conform to AAUW bylaws in all material respects. The mandatory state and branch bylaw amendment revisions were listed. These revisions do not require a vote of the state or branch membership. In cooperation with Virginia AAUW, the changes to our branch bylaws were made by the branch bylaws committee and were accepted by the state and also by national. The changes address wording regarding purpose, financial administration, elections, officers, and meetings.

#### **Up and Running**

As citizens in Virginia we have to be 'up and running' these days. Although we are slowly getting used to '2016' when we write, March 1 will be upon us soon. That is the date of Super Tuesday in many southern states, the date of the 2016 presidential primaries in Virginia! Although the series of presidential debates had seemed endless, it's time for Virginia voters to make our voice heard.

Vote your choice on March 1 at your regular polling place. Or consider the absentee voting in person schedule that extends from Jan. 15 to Feb. 27. During this period you can vote at the Government Center, weekdays 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., (on Thursdays 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.) On Saturday, Feb. 27 you can vote in person at the McLean Government Center from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. There are 19 valid reasons to vote absentee.

You can apply for an absentee ballot online by printing the online absentee ballot application. Fax or email it and your absentee ballot will be sent to you in the regular mail; you then mail your ballot. For any questions, email voting@fairfaxcounty.gov.

#### Virginia General Assembly

As Senator Janet Howell has reported, the 60-day session has started and it will have to pass the biennial state budget of more than \$109 billion. The Republican majority made changes in rules and banished the press from the Senate floor. One of the proposed bills would prohibit state agencies from assisting any efforts by the federal government to resettle certain refugees in Virginia. Be sure to read the area's papers to find out the progress of legislation. Finally, you may know that a three-judge panel of a federal court has picked a new congressional map that significantly changes the racial makeup of two districts and it ordered Virginia to establish a new redistricting map for the 2016 election. The panel had concluded for a second time that legislators in 2012 had illegally packed black voters into the 3<sup>rd</sup> Congressional District.

#### Out of Virginia!

On Jan. 14 at the National Press Club, AAUW's Vice President of Government Relations Lisa Maatz and Government Relations Manager Anne Hedgepeth discussed trends in campus sexual assault policy and offered insights on the legislative actions necessary to improve the current climate on college campuses. They provided a breakdown of a recent AAUW analysis that showed 91 percent of college campuses reported zero incident of rape in 2014.

Meanwhile hundreds of AAUW members have pledged to deliver new resources from the U.S. Department of Education to Title IX coordinators at schools in their area. There will be an all member conference call to hear the status of those efforts including recent success stories and tips for overcoming common challenges from those who have already take action.
