Ann Mazur and the Victorian Theatrical Society at the University of Virginia will present "Not a Man in the House: A Comedy in Two Acts," a parlour theatrical written by S. Jennie Smith and published in 1897 in Chicago. The Victorian parlour play demonstrates the importance of theatre and acting in the everyday life and domestic spaces of women.

Ann Mazur, graduated from the University of Virginia this spring with a doctoral degree in English literature and is currently revising her dissertation into a book manuscript. Mazur's project recovers the Victorian parlour play. The overlooked parlour play occupied a literary marketplace dominated by women, most frequently the authors and the

intended actors. Her research contextualizes home theatre practices within scholarship about the Victorian public theatre, domestic space, and emergent Victorian psychology of acting. In her spare time Mazur managed to teach more than 500 yoga classes and to prepare herself to run in the Nike Women's Half Marathon in Washington D.C. She finished third out of 15,000 runners. She is delighted to come to McLean to give back through a performance with the Victorian Theatrical Society.

The September branch event will be held in the Rehearsal Hall of the McLean Community Center, on Sunday September 28 at 2:30 p.m.

A Reminder Why We're Here

AAUW's mission consists of advancing equity for women and girls through

advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research.

Our principles for action include the economic, social and physical well being of all persons; the right to privacy and freedom from violence; affirmative action to improve diversity; global interdependence.

The biennial action priorities include supporting a strong system of public education including promotion of STEM education; achievement of economic self-sufficiency for all women including pay equity; guarantee of equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse society. AAUW recently asked its members for comments on the proposed renewed set of principles. Each member will have an opportunity in 2015 to vote for the final version.

Meanwhile, it's all about elections this fall

On August 18, I appeared as public policy chair of our branch on the television program *Inside Scoop* on Fairfax Public Access Channel 10. The theme of the program was to highlight Get Out The Vote (GOTV) efforts that our local organizations are pursuing. In addition, we also discussed obstacles to voting. I was interviewed along with members from the League of Women Voters, the Coalition of Pacific Asian Voters, AARP, and Zeta Phi Beta Sorority. *

A League of Women Voters member had previously approached our branch leaders with an invitation to co-sponsor a candidate 'Meet and Greet'. During the past month arrangements were completed (see accompanying

article). The event will be held on Thursday Oct. 9, 7 to 9 p.m., at the McLean Community Center.

It's My Vote. I will be heard. This is the rallying cry from the AAUW Action Fund and its Get Out the Vote (GOTV) effort. AAUW members are urged to become informed about the issues and actively promote – Get Out the Vote.

Around the state of Virginia

On Aug. 19 a special election was held to elect a representative for the 48th district in the House of Delegates. The area includes some parts of North Arlington and McLean. Rip Sullivan, Democrat of McLean, won over Dave Foster, Republican from Arlington, approximately 62 percent to 38 percent. This leaves the make-up of the House 38 Democrats to 62 Republicans.

Meanwhile, state Republican leaders plan to call the House and Senate back into session in September to debate Medicaid expansions. The decision shows that Republicans are willing to discuss expanding Medicaid as long as the matter is divorced from the state budget. Disagreement over Medicaid led to a months-long budget standoff that threatened to trigger a government shutdown July 1. Senate Democrats and three moderate Republicans agreed to pass a budget that did not expand the health care program.

Hear Them In Person! Nine Candidates Running for Congress!

ur branch is co-sponsoring a "Meet and Greet" event featuring candidates running for Congress for the 8th and 10th Congressional Districts. We are working with the League of Women Voters, AARP, and the Coalition of American Pacific Asians of Northern Virginia, and other organizations. The "Meet and Greet" will be held Thursday, October 9 from 7 to 9 p.m. at the McLean Community Center.

You will have the chance to hear each of the candidates speak for three minutes at the beginning and end. Then they will respond to written questions – from you – that may be directed to specific candidates. A member of the League of Women Voters will conduct the program.

You will meet Micah Edmond (R), Don Beyer (D), Jeffrey Carson (Libertarian), Gerry Blais (Independent Green), and Gwendolyn Beck (Independent) who hope to represent the 8th Congressional District.

For the 10th Congressional District, meet John Foust (D), William Redpath (Libertarian), Dianne Blais (Independent Green), and Brad Eickholt (Independent). As of August 22 Republican Barbara Comstock has not responded.

Bring your neighbors! It's up to voters – us – to elect new representatives to replace Frank Wolf (10th Congressional District) and Jim Moran (8th Congressional District). Or, come early to help and wear something AAUW-teal!

Branch Boosts STEM

he McLean Area Branch has a special interest in encouraging young women and girls to pursue educational opportunities related to STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math). Our activities include STEMtastics, support for the Kent Gardens Elementary School Science Fair, a STEM Excellence Award, and High School Achievement Awards in Math and Science.


The McLean Area Branch partnered with counselors at McLean, Langley, and Marshall High Schools to award Science and Math Achievement Awards to six female students finishing their junior year. Each award, which is funded through the branch's annual book sale, consists of a certificate and a check for \$100 for the honoree.

The criteria for the awards include a demonstrated record of overall academic success, as well as a distinguished record of achievement in either math or science. Career center counselors at the schools managed the process of selecting the students.

The June 2014 newsletter included articles on our STEM Excellence Award recipient and the High School achievement awards recipients from McLean High School. The Langley and Marshall High School Achieve-

id you know that in 1920, the Association of Collegiate Alumnae (the predecessor to AAUW) helped raise money to purchase a gram of radium for Marie Curie? Please refer to an article taken from the March 15, 2013, Issue on Education entitled "When Marie Curie Needed Radium, We Obliged," by Suzanne Gould regarding Fellowships and Grants. It explains how to this day, we have the "Marie Curie Fellowship." The Marie Curie Fellowship awarded its first fellowship in 1963. It exists today "to support a French or American woman studying chemistry, physics, or radiology."

One may ask why bring this information forward at this time. First of all, we, as members of the AAUW McLean Area Branch are in the midst of preparing and launching a used book sale to raise funds in support of women furthering their efforts in education, research, and/or community action, and more. The time and energy that is being put into this project speak volumes to the efforts of branch members. Thank you! 2013-14: Precious Chindime—Career Development

Precious Chindime is pursuing a master's degree in public policy in order to advocate internationally for women and girls. After witnessing poverty and domestic violence as a child, she dedicated her life to women's issues including sex trafficking, genital mutilation, education, and systems that uphold the subjugation of women. She has promoted equity as a founder of an organization that aims to

empower vulnerable women and children.

FUNDS 4319 and 4267

2014-15: Lynchburg Beacon of Hope— Community Action

AAUW's grant will support the Beacon of Hope Future Centers at two Lynchburg high schools as well as the college prep curriculum at three middle schools. The Future Centers hope to achieve the completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by all seniors, outreach to middle schools, student visits to post-secondary programs, standardized testing assistance, and mentoring initiatives for students. The project director is Laura Hamilton.

FUND 4267

2013-14: Chesapeake Experience—Community Action

Chesapeake Experience will provide a unique educational leadership opportunity for girls aged 13-17 in Hampton Roads, Virginia. Participants will attend three weekend programs with an emphasis on the Chesapeake Bay and leadership skills. The girls will design and execute a community service project relevant to the Chesapeake Bay or another environmental cause. Weekend programs will include outdoor activities, project planning, and guest speakers. Project Director is Jill Bieri, Yorktown, VA.

FUND 1815

2013-14: Eva Kabundu—International Fellowship

Eva Kabundu is a state attorney working with the Attorney General's Chambers, Ministry of Justice & Constitutional Affairs, Kampala, Uganda. Eva Kabundu's study will focus on international trade, business, free trade agreements, arbitration, and human rights/gender. American University, Washington, D.C.

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Where Does the Money Go?

Play a Part in the Decision-Making

Three branch members will be elected at the September branch event to serve on the branch allocations committee.
