Why We Give to AAUW Funds

By policy, our branch must give 50% of our book sale proceeds to AAUW Funds. A question that arises, especially among newer members, is, "What are AAUW Funds and why do we give to them?" Branch member Nancy Richardson, who has 36 years of experience with our book sales (serving many times as chair, as well as twice branch president), recently replied to that question with as good an answer as we've ever read. Here's Nancy's response:

Dear Virginia,

I may not be the best person to answer your question, but I have strong feelings when it comes to our funds allocation. When I first joined the branch, we chose to give 80% of our book sale net to AAUW's Educational Foundation. Not long thereafter, interest in local college scholarships arose. In response, the branch set aside money for these scholarships and began giving AAUW's Educational Foundation only 66%. As interest in the local scholarships continued to grow, the branch again responded, agreeing that at least 50% of our net will be used to support AAUW Funds (new name for Educational Foundation), with much of the rest designated for local giving.

Many members think local scholarships and awards provide more visible community outreach, give the branch more control over use of the money we earn, inspire young girls, and give women in need the financial support that enables them to return to college to complete their degrees.

Others point out that McLean Area Branch has contributed more than most at the national level. We've supported AAUW research into learning and have built multiple AAUW endowments that support, and will continue to support, post-graduate education for women. It's long been felt that AAUW's support for post-graduate education is a strong driver of systemic change because the women selected to receive this money are among the best and the brightest, women whose future work may well impact millions of people.

Another AAUW iron in the fire includes support for female college educators justifiably seeking but denied tenure, redress for discrimination, and justice in sexual harassment cases. Often women are not able to stand up alone against a college or university's money and power. Recently AAUW expanded this support to women in the work place. McLean Branch has regularly contributed funds for this work as well.

Most recently, AAUW launched a series of far-reaching projects aimed at young women, projects focusing on STEM education, landing a good job, negotiating fair pay, learning how to run for campus office, and more. What a boost for this population!

What I've written thus far may not cover all that AAUW Funds do, but what is certain is that we are a branch of AAUW, not an independent club. We subscribe to AAUW's mission, goals, and efforts to support women and girls. Without AAUW we'd simply be another gaggle of women, a small group with relatively small clout, and likely a group destined for the dust heap. Through its extensive network, trusted national reputation (especially on Capitol Hill), and multiple diverse efforts to support women and girls, AAUW gives us life, and a highly respected life at that.

Bottom line, let's continue to support the many talented women and girls who've come before our branch and wowed us with their determination and accomplishments, but let's never forget the true source of our widest reach and greatest success for women, AAUW.

We have reformatted the program to accommodate more students and are expecting about 700 students and parents, compared to 500 in 2017. Your participation is more critical than ever.

WHEN/WHERE: This year's event is scheduled for Saturday morning, March 10, 2018, at NOVA – Annandale.

VOLUNTEERS: More than 80 volunteers are needed on the day of the event. SignUp Genius describes almost 30 different assignments for which volunteers are needed at the event. **Assignments** include:

- · serving as a student workshop assistant in a classroom;
- · helping with morning refreshments;
- serving as a theater usher;
- checking in students at registration using a smartphone app;
- greeting parent workshop presenters and checking them in

Public Policy Update

AAUW's mission of advancing equity for women and girls includes opposition to all forms of discrimination and supports constitutional protection for the civil rights of all individuals.

AAUW Celebrates Women in Wartime and in Space

Without much recognition, women played key roles during war time supporting military efforts way before they were admitted into the armed services. In the early 1940s, women were vital to any number of wartime advances. Their presence was crucial in intelligence and communications. More than half of the American code breaking force was female, about 10,000 women. Most were college graduates who had been shut out of the graduate schools and excluded from math and engineering.

Women served in the **Women Air Force Service Pilots (WASP)** and flew thousands of noncombat missions during World War II. Considered civilians during the war, they were granted veteran status in 1977 and were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal in 2009. Unfortunately, the U.S. Army revoked WASP members' rights to be buried in the Arlington National Cemetery with military honors.

One of the original WASPs was the mother-in-law of AAUW member Linda Harmon, who along with AAUW members from around the country, **sent thousands of messages** through the AAUW Action Network to their elected officials urging them to honor these amazing women by **allowing them burial rights at Arlington**. With the **additional support of Senators Barbara Mikulski** and **Joni Ernst**, **President Obama gave the WASP veterans** the **recognition** they deserve by signing the inurnment bill into law.

In 1966, the AAUW Achievement Award winner was **Dora Dougherty**, one of two women selected to test fly the B-29 Superfortress heavy bomber during World War II. AAUW Fellow **Judith Resnik** became the second American woman in space and died in the 1986 Challenger explosion. **Graciela Tiscareno-Sato**, an Air Force veteran, received the 1998 Career Development grant. The AAUW Achievement Award was given to **Mae Jemison**, the first African American woman in space. **Pam Melroy**, a 2014 AAUW Woman of Distinction, was a NASA astronaut, one of only two women to have commanded a space shuttle.

Women at Work – Know your Rights

In a recent issue of AAUW What We Do, sexual harassment, a form of sex discrimination that violates Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, was described as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors or other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature. **Even with Title VII's protections, many people still face sexual harassment in their workplaces** that can include conduct that is verbal, physical or both, may be repeated, hostile or offensive, may be by a co-worker or supervisor. Either gender can be victim of sexual harassment, and a single severe incident may be sufficient to constitute a Title VII violation. **Title VII forbids employers from retaliating against the victim for filing a charge of harassment or speaking out against the harassment.** The **victim may file a complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC)** that will notify the employer of the claim, begin an investigation into the complaint, and may attempt to settle the complaint or eventually file a lawsuit in federal court.
