# **STEM Essay Contest Winners**

The winners of the 2021 STEM Essay Contest sponsored by the McLean Area Branch were announced and recognized during the Branch event held via Zoom on March 16. The contest was open to 7th and 8th grade students (girls and boys) at local public and private schools. The students were asked to discover and publicize women who made a difference in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) fields, but who did not receive recognition for their contributions while alive and whose contributions are not well known even today. Each essay

described a selected woman's contribution and its impact, as well as why the student chose her.

The Branch received a record number of entries for this year's contest. There were 47 completed submissions, compared to 18 in each of the two prior years. The winners of the contest are:

- 1st Place: **Zoe Robell**, Longfellow Middle School (7th Grade)
- 2nd Place: Michelle Liu, Longfellow Middle School (7th Grade)
- Honorable Mention: Carter Kunz, The Langley School (7th Grade)
- Honorable Mention: Brendan Li, Cooper Middle School (7<sup>th</sup> Grade)

The students and their parents were invited to the March 16 event. As part of the awards ceremony, the 1st place winner, Zoe Robell, read her essay on Grace Hopper, computer scientist and United States Navy rear admiral who was an early developer of high-level programming languages. Other women who were the subjects of the winning essays are Chien-Shiung Wu, a Chinese American physicist who worked on the Manhattan project and has been nicknamed the "Chinese Madame Curie," and June Almeida, a Scottish virologist who discovered a group of viruses in 1966 that were later named the coronavirus.

Fourteen volunteers from our Branch served as judges: Pam Bacher, Marie Briones-Jones, Marlene Chivavibul, Dorothy Hassan, Myrtle Hendricks-Corrales, Sherry Joslin, Nina McVeigh, Tom McVeigh, Ruth Nowjack-Raymer, Judy Page, Caroline Pickens, Betsy Schroeder, Barbara Sipe, and Adarsh Trehan. The essay contest was managed by a steering committee, consisting of Marlene Chivavibul, Myrtle

Hendricks-Corrales, and Betsy Schroeder, together with Judy Page, STEM Chair.

#### **Congressional News**

On March 3, the House passed For the People Act, HR1. The partisan vote was 220-210. It was received in the Senate on March 11. The bill will expand the right to vote with automatic voter registration online and same day registration. It would end partisan and racial gerrymandering in favor of independent redistricting commissions and would provide more transparency

by holding elected officials accountable and require candidates to provide financial disclosures.

The Paycheck Fairness Act lives again in the House as HR7. In response to Lily Ledbetter Supreme Court denial of her equal wages, this bill will close loopholes that have weakened the law allowing employers to justify paying workers unfairly. It would create robust remedies for those who have suffered discrimination and prevent employers from retaliating against workers who discuss or disclose their wages. It would prohibit employers from relying on salary history to set wages and provide data collection, research, and training. The recently passed Covid Relief bill will help improve the loss of jobs by women.

In March, Federal Judge **Rudolph Contreras** dealt a blow to all those advocating for the Equal Rights Amendment. He ruled that the deadline to ratify the ERA "expired long ago" and three states' recent ratifications of the amendment arrived "too late to count." Virginia, Illinois, and Nevada had sued the archivist of the United States last year to "carry out his statutory duty" of publishing and certifying the ERA as the 28<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the Constitution. Five states had also intervened to rescind their ratifications of the ERA between 1973 and 1979. Virginia Attorney General **Mark Herring** said he is not giving up this fight and will consider all options moving forward.

Twenty Lobby Corps members met virtually again and are taking actions to communicate legislative issues and support by email and social media, including responding to Facebook and newsletter messages from legislators who support our issues.

#### Virginia AAUW and Virginia Commonwealth

AAUW Virginia Public Policy Co-Chairs **Denise Murden** and **Susan Burk** gave a thorough review of the legislation passed in the General Assembly and its future strategies, such as joining with coalitions, to become more effective. We could also help to support business that continue to pay sick leave for their employees.

The final session of the General Assembly closed February 27. Members in the House passed a resolution for a committee to study and make recommendations on campaign finance reform. Several environmental bills passed include clear car standards, a clean energy plan, and a polystyrene ban.

Guidelines and standards will be developed for teaching computer science. Nationwide, Virginia joined the group of states that has banned capital punishment.

The state budget passed that includes increased teacher salaries, recovery grants for K-12 school, grant funding for childcare services, increased student aid at colleges and universities, increased pay and sick days for personal care workers, tax relief for many businesses, renter's protection extension, and increased the reserve fund by \$900M to maintain AAA bond rating.

This year in Virginia, citizens will have the opportunity to vote for their state delegate, the governor, lieutenant governor and attorney general. In June, Democratic primaries will be held for many offices and Republicans will hold conventions.
