STEM Excellence Award Announced at May Branch Event

Amna Imran, a senior at George C. Marshall High School, was selected as the 2021 recipient of our Branch's STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Excellence Award. The STEM Excellence Award is given to a female

student or team from a high school in the McLean area with an outstanding project in the engineering field entered in the Fairfax County Regional Science and Engineering Fair.

This year, the students participated in a Virtual Science Fair by submitting six-minute videos for the judges to review. Myrtle Hendricks-Corrales and Judy Page, serving as judges for our Branch, reviewed videos for 11 projects to determine the winner. Judges were impressed by Amna's work on the project, "The Relationship Between External Temperature and the Useful Power Output of a Small Electric Motor Lifting a Constant Mass to a Constant Height," including the video to describe the project. Amna was motivated to investigate this issue based on her experiences living in Pakistan until the age of 15. She plans to study bioengineering at the University of Pittsburgh starting this fall.

For the award, **Amna** received a Certificate of Merit and a check for \$100. In addition to receiving the AAUW STEM Excellence Award, **Amna** received five other awards for her project at the Regional Science and Engineering Fair, including one from the DC chapter of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

High School STEM Awards Recipients

Six female students have been selected as the recipients of the Branch's high school Math, Science, and Computer Science Achievement Awards for 2021. For the last eight years, the McLean Area Branch has partnered with counselors at local high schools to award these achievement awards to female



students finishing their junior year. Each award consists of a certificate and a check for \$100 which were mailed to the students. The Branch instituted the awards to encourage young women to pursue educational opportunities related to STEM.

The criteria for the awards include a demonstrated record of overall academic success and a distinguished record of achievement in either math, science, or computer science. The award for computer science was added this year to recognize students' achievements in this important field.

Career center counselors at the schools manage the process of selecting the students. The following students received the 2021 awards:

We plan to invite the students to an event in the fall for recognition by Branch members.

Three Surprises with the STEM Essay Winners

When *two* of our middle school STEM essay winners this year chose the same person, **Dr. Chien-Shiung Wu**, that was the **first surprise**. Both **Michelle Liu** (2nd place) and **Brandon Li** (honorable mention) wrote about this nuclear physicist, a member of the Manhattan Project team, whose experiments and designs were groundbreaking and crucial. Two male colleagues who worked with her were awarded the Nobel Prize in Physics, but **Dr. Wu** was ignored.

The **second surprise** was recognition for Dr. Wu, finally, with a U.S. stamp this spring.

Then recently, a **third surprise** was found in our AAUW history. The Nobel Prize gentlemen may have ignored her in 1957, but AAUW did not. In 1959 at the national AAUW Convention, **Dr. Wu** was given the AAUW

Achievement Award, the highest award AAUW gives. Special thanks to **Caroline Pickens** for this discovery.

National News

On May 4, the Public Policy staff of AAUW presented a webinar about advancing priorities in the first 100 days of the **Biden** administration and beyond. AAUW's priorities include family and child. The White House has issued executive orders to advance racial equity and address gender identity.

The Secretary of Education has established a review of Title IX in the Office of Civil Rights and established a gender policy council. Kate Nielson, staff Public Policy Director, reported that AAUW drafted the document that establishes that council.

Another priority is the burden of student debt with efforts to support the forgiveness of some amount of that debt. Lobbying is underway for the For the People Act, the Healthy Families Act, and the Paycheck Fairness Act. The Senate remains a huge obstacle for most legislation since 60 votes are required and the Senate is split evenly along party lines.

Virginia

The Virginia Democratic Primary date in your precinct is **June 8**. Early in-person voting started April 24 at the Fairfax Government Center. The deadline to request an absentee ballot was **May 28**. The deadline for early in-person voting at the Government Center is **June 5**.

The Republican primary was held as a drive-in vote across the state on May 8. The following won nominations: **Glenn Youngkin** for Governor, **Jason Miyares** for Attorney General; and Virginia Beach former state delegate, **Winsome E. Sears**, for Lieutenant Governor.

During the summer months, debates among the candidates will be held. Plan to learn more about candidate positions. An educated and informed voter is the basis for democracy.
