Student Inclusion Recognition Award

The McLean Area Branch is committed to increasing diversity, inclusion, and equity in all facets of its work in the community. To that end, the Student Inclusion Recognition Award was recommended by the DE&I Committee in 2022 and approved by the Board. The award was created to acknowledge area high school juniors' efforts to make their school environments welcoming to students of all backgrounds, heritages, and abilities.

The 2023 recipient of the Student Inclusion Recognition Award from McLean High School is **Lauren Vandivier**. **Ms. Vandivier** was presented with a certificate of award and \$100 at the high school's award ceremony by AAUW DE&I Committee Co-chair **Myrtle Hendricks Corrales** and Co-Vice President for Programs **Mafalda Marrocco**.

Ms. Vandivier, the Secretary-General of McLean High School's Model United Nations Club, was accepted into the Virginia Residential Governor's School for Humanities and is a member of the National Honor Society and the National English Honor Society. Her commitment to ensuring that students from all backgrounds experience an inclusive environment are numerous and include serving as a mentor to incoming freshmen as part of the McLeadership program, and as a head council member of the Committee on Raising Student Voices, an organization that seeks to bridge the gap between the student body and the high school's administration. Recent activities of the committee include assuring that official messages are translated into multiple languages for the student body and their parents, that AFAB (assigned female at birth) students have increased access to sanitary products in restrooms, and Ms. Vandivier's major focus, creating an allergy awareness initiative. Ms. Vandivier is advocating for epinephrine and anaphylaxis training in all Fairfax County high schools. This initiative has required considerable research on the Virginia legislation surrounding food allergies and countless meetings with the McLean High School administration, the Fairfax County Health Department staff, and district representatives, all in the hopes that students with life-threatening allergies will experience a safe and inclusive high school experience. Ms. Vandivier will be honored by the Branch membership at the September meeting where we will learn first-hand about her efforts.

Three female students were recently recognized as the recipients of the STEM Achievement Awards for 2023 at McLean High School at a recent awards ceremony. Myrtle Hendricks-Corrales, liaison to McLean HS, and Mafalda Marrocco attended the McLean High School Awards Ceremony on April 27, 2023, to present each student with a Certificate of Merit and a check for \$100. STEM Awards

STEM Excellence Award Presented at Annual Branch Luncheon

Celina Zaccack, a junior at George Marshall High School, has been selected as the 2023 recipient of the branch STEM Excellence Award. The STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Excellence Award is given to a female student or team from a high school in the McLean area with an outstanding project in the field of Engineering entered in the Fairfax County Regional Science and Engineering Fair.

This year the students participated in an in-person science fair and prepared a six-minute video for the judges to review in advance. Phyllis Yoshida and Judy Page served as judges for our branch. They were impressed by the work done by Celina on the project, "Winged Noise Barriers: The Future of Efficient Highway Sound Suppression," as it represented an innovative solution to a highway noise problem that Celina encountered while at school. In addition to our award, Celina was selected as a second-place category winner in Engineering Technology: Statics and Dynamics and received First Place for Excellence in Mobility Engineering from SAE International (Washington DC Chapter). She received additional awards from the American Industrial Hygiene Association, the Armed Forces Communications and Electronics Association (Northern VA Chapter), and The Aerospace Corporation.

Celina was presented with the STEM Excellence Award at the branch luncheon May 20 held at River Bend Club, where she made remarks about her project and her interest in STEM. Her mother, **Joey Zaccack**, also attended the event. For the award, **Celina** received a Certificate of Merit and a check for \$100.

Why ERA Matters

On April 27, a joint resolution to remove an expired deadline for states to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) received 51 bipartisan votes in the U.S. Senate but fell short of the 60 votes necessary for the resolution to advance under current Senate rules. The ERA would protect the fundamental rights of women to live as equal citizens in America. Properly applied, it would guard against discrimination based on pregnancy and motherhood, and it would protect women's control over their reproductive lives. Currently the only right that cannot be denied or abridged "on account of sex" in the Constitution is the right to vote.

Virginia State Budget

Neither chamber could resolve budget proposals by the February 25 deadline. The Senate proposal included investments in public schools. The House of Delegates proposed tax cuts for profitable corporations. While legislators are still working on a final budget, conferees and the governor have agreed on a "stop-gap" budget that provides one-time allocations to the state's rainy-day fund, retirement system, and capital projects, as well as almost \$17 million toward fixing the \$201 million math error by the State Department of Education, among other expenditures.

Ruth Nowjack-Raymer Making a Difference

- 1. Recycle all plastic bags at grocery stores.
- 2. Use dinnerware rather than paper plates and single use plasticware.
- 3. Use paper bags as weed blockers in garden.
- 4. Use cloth reusable shopping bags whenever possible.
- 5. Participate as shareholder in local CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) year-round that includes vegetables, eggs, meats.
- 6. Limit beef consumption because of methane production.
- 7. Check sourcing information and purchase what is most locally grown.
- 8. Support local farmers who are concerned about the environment.
- 9. Use mulch and don't water the lawn.
- 10. Contract with pest control that uses environmentally friendly products.
- 11. Donated to the Arbor Day Foundation and received six tree seedlings planted by my husband.
- 12. Reuse plastic milk jugs as containers to start seedlings.
- 13. Grow in wooden planters on deck herbs, tomatoes.
- 14. Grow plants that attract bees and butterflies.
- 15. Remove invasive species to encourage native species.
- 16. Include edibles in landscape such as fruit trees.
- 17. Can or freeze all excess fruits and vegetables.
